I feel sure the Trustees will be satisfied that the Nurses have done their duty during the year 1885. If the Trustees will be good enough to look at the statistics in my report of the work done they will observe that the Nurses have worked many days more in 1885 than in 1883 and 1884 and two months more than in 1882.

More work could have been done had not two of the Nurses been ill, one for two months & the other for six weeks. As it is, two of them have worked some little over eight months.

Two of the Nurses had their months

leave of absence the third was
too ill to leave the building.
I have had many Applications
for Nurses that I have not been
able to grant for the want of
more help -

I wish to call the attention of
the Trustees to the time the
Nurses go to their patients in
the morning - Some time back
they were often as late as ten
o'clock - I found from the
patients this was a great in-
convenience to them and I have
endeavoured to make the Nurses
go much earlier, but have had
great trouble to get them to do so.

I should be very much obliged if the Trustees would have a printed Circular sent to the Nurses stating that they are to be at their Cases at 8.30 A.M. They will then understand that I have authority for telling them they should leave the Building soon after eight.

So much has been pointed to me that I am unwilling to ask anything further whatever, but I may perhaps be allowed to mention that it would be a very great boon to the Formates & Nurses to have gas put into their bedrooms. These bedrooms are really like ice houses in the winter.

For myself I have to thank you
very much, for the great improve-
ments in my little house, which
have added very considerably to
my comfort & well being -
